## PREPARING AND BENCHING ORCHIDS FOR THE SHOW.

### *Preparation.*

**Aspect** When you notice buds/inflorescences start to develop on your orchid try to keep the plant orientated in the same position. Most plants are phototropic (i.e. they orient themselves towards the light source) so if the light source keeps changing the flowers can become confused and may open in random directions rather than all facing the same way. The exception may be if you have a specimen plant with multiple inflorescences and you want them evenly spaced around the plant.

**Staking** For cymbidiums and other orchids with a long inflorescence this process should start long before the show. As soon as you see a spike emerge insert a stake nearby. As the inflorescence develops, progressively move the ties along the stake so the raceme grows where you want it to. The stake should be as unobtrusive as possible. Avoid ugly 'tomato stakes'. Use the thinnest stake possible to do the job. Ties or clips should not be too obvious and tops of stakes projecting above the last tie should be removed. Temporary stakes used to support the plant during transport to the show should be removed after benching. It's no good to try to tie up an inflorescence that has been 'doing its own thing' on the day before the show. If you don't snap the spike the flowers will all be upside down or twisted. Start your staking early.

Orchids with pendulous spikes may not need staking but they may need 'guidance' to position themselves advantageously for display. Some judicious manipulation of leaves and spikes can ensure that the maximum number of flowers is visible to the judges.

**Grooming** Make sure your pots and plants are clean and free from pests and diseases. Old backbulbs and dead bracts should be removed, and leaves wiped clean of dust and fertiliser residue. Cut off any black leaf tips. The top of the media can be tidied using a fresh layer of material, preferably bark.

**Clean the pot.** If it is not possible to clean the pot you can 'double pot' it by putting it inside another clean pot of the same size or just slightly larger. Remember that if more than one plant is on a mount or in a pot the grower must nominate which plant is being exhibited as only one exhibit can be judged.

### *Transporting Orchid to Shows*

If an orchid arrives at a show with the inflorescence broken or a flower knocked off or the flowers are bruised and battered and a hastily made sign saying 'Damaged in Transit' is displayed, it doesn't have much chance of being judged the Grand Champion. Preparing your plants for the car trip is just as important as preparing them for the show bench.

### *Staging/ Benching*

Staging is another name for benching your orchid. It's about giving your plant its best chance in the judging process and also helping to make the benching marshal's job as easy as possible.

Your plant needs to be self-supporting when it is benched, and it needs to be able to be moved by the benching marshal. That is, you can't bring your orchid in, put it on the bench and then arrange some prop to hold the flower spike up which will fall if the plant is moved.

Pendulous plants usually don't need staking, but they do need to be raised so their racemes are above the bench – use an upturned pot, stand, etc. Make sure the combination of orchid and support are stable and moveable.

Every plant benched should have its name **clearly** visible on a benching card with the owner's name clearly printed on the reverse. Make sure that the correct name is displayed. When you bench your plant decide which is its best side and put that side facing the front with the benching card in front of it. That way, if the benching marshal must move your plant s/he will know which side you want the judges to look at.

Ensure the pot/plant is self-supporting and **stable**. It is your responsibility to bench a plant that can be moved as required by the marshals so it must be stable. If the pot is unable to hold the plant securely

then use a heavier pot just large enough to contain the original pot and pack tightly around the pot so that it fits snugly inside the outer pot. The outer pot should be as unobtrusive as possible; you want the orchid to be the centre of attention, not the pot.

- Similarly, it is your responsibility to provide suitable structures to display mounted or hanging plants to their best advantage. If a plant has a pendulous habit, then you will need to have a framework from which to suspend it. Again, it needs to be able to be moved around by the marshals if required.

Top heavy plants can be made stable by double potting into a larger pot, packing in the space between with damp newspaper. Brian has a stack of these already made up as he grows most of his plants in tiny pots in trays and they rarely stand up by themselves.

You can also make a pot holder out of a larger pot if the plant is unstable. Cut a circle out of the bottom out of the larger pot so the rim of the smaller one fits inside but doesn't fall through the upturned holder pot.

Small orchids often benefit from being raised so the judges can see them better. VERY small orchid flowers may need a magnifying glass so the visiting members of the public can appreciate them!

Brian grows a lot of his plants hooked onto wire mesh along the walls of the glasshouse. These can be similarly displayed on the bench using a simple home-made stand which has a vertical piece of timber through which two holes have been drilled about 4mm apart and a cable tie firmly looped through. The twin hook pot holder will hook through the tie allowing the plant to hang as it has been growing. Or you can use a piece of reinforcing mesh bent into a V-shape.

(I think) Species should be presented how they grow so if it has a natural arching spike it shouldn't be staked straight up. (That's my opinion though it isn't a judging rule.) I have seen species cymbidiums staked upright but I think they look much better if they can arch gracefully as they do naturally.

You can use decorative pots but use a pot that doesn't overwhelm the orchid. The orchid should catch the judge's eyes, not the pot.

### **TIPS for June [Winter].**

Winter is upon us and we need to be aware that orchids, mostly don't like cold weather.

Frosts cause cellular damage, which can devastate an orchid quickly [ we notice this first] or



more slowly [ they seem alright and slowly darken and die] over time.

Placing your orchids out of potential frost sites is most important.

There are numerous shade clothes available that help, plus even some applications which give the orchid added strength to cope with the cold.



Now is the time to take off summer extra shade cloth, to give the orchids the best chance of the most sunshine they need

Be aware, bugs are still hungering after your spikes and buds.

Stay warm, stay vigilant, enjoy your hobby. :) A.M.
